

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WANTED! New Home Watch co-ordinators.

The parish of Delamere currently has a Home Watch Scheme in operation. With Delamere and Oakmere expected to come together as a single parish next spring, now is an ideal time to expand the scheme to cover both. Volunteers are therefore needed to act as local coordinators for Oakmere, and also for parts of Delamere that are not at present covered. A new overall co-ordinator will also be needed, to act as the main link between the local coordinators and the police.

The role of a local Home Watch co-ordinator is not onerous. It is simply to provide advice and support to a neighbour if they are unsure of what action to take on any concern they might have. Guidance is provided on how to deal with different kinds of problem, including when to dial 999, when to dial the police non-emergency number 101, and when it would be more appropriate to contact the local Police Community Support Officer (Phil Brandreth for Delamere and Ryan Reid for Oakmere). Our local Police Community Inspector, Keith Curbishley, provides regular updates by email to the overall co-ordinator, who passes them on to local co-ordinators as required.

The main aims of a Home Watch scheme are to:

- Provide reassurance to local residents and reduce the fear of crime and anti-social behaviour.
- Cut crime and the opportunities for crime and anti-social behaviour.
- Encourage neighbourliness and closer communities.
- Improve the quality of life for local residents.

The scheme does not in any way replace local policing, but works in partnership with the police by sharing information which may only be available to local residents. It serves an extremely valuable purpose, but cannot operate without local volunteers.

It was originally intended to re-launch the scheme at a public meeting in October, with a presentation from Cheshire's Police and Crime Commissioner John Dwyer. This has now been postponed due to a change in Mr Dwyer's other commitments, but the scheme still needs new volunteers!

Parish Council news

Delamere Parish Council Chairman's Letter

With only four months to go before they are replaced by two newly elected councils, one for Willington and the other for Delamere and Oakmere combined, both our parish councils have been giving some thought to the future. There are limits to what we can do without preempting decisions that are not ours to make, but we would love to hear your views. example, what about the simple matter of boundary signs? Should the new Willington make a big splash with eye-catching signs on its Should the new Delamere and Oakmere parish announce itself to the world in the same way? Or should we save money by leaving the signs as they are, marking the boundaries of the Delamere and Oakmere wards, but not the new parish as a whole? Or something in between? There is some money available for such things, but would it be better spent on something else? Tell us what you think, on this or any other matter related to the reorganisation, by telling your local councillor or sending a note to Joanne Monks, Clerk to both councils (delamereclerk@yahoo.co.uk, 9 Maori Drive, Frodsham, WA6 7BS).

On a related issue, we have been keeping an eye on how Kelsall have been getting on with their Neighbourhood Development Plan. something that our new councils might well want to consider, because, in theory at least, it gives local communities much more power over housing proposals for new and other developments. Kelsall are hoping that once their NDP is in place (they are aiming for the spring or summer of next year), it will enable them to place limits on future developments, ensure that they only take place in locations that local people favour, and make sure that needs for schooling, medical facilities and other local services are taken properly into account. Good luck to them!

The planning application for up to 50 houses in Delamere near the border with Kelsall has been rejected by Cheshire West and Chester Council, following strong objections from both Delamere and Kelsall. We still await the outcome of the planning inquiry into the Forestry Commission's proposals for developments in the forest. The Secretary of State was due to announce his decision in November, but we haven't heard anything yet.

We are well aware that road safety issues are a concern for many residents. We have been working closely with CW&C Highways on this, and also with PCSO Phil Brandreth. Phil has been busy with his speed gun around the parish. which seems to be having a noticeable effect. CW&C Highways are on the whole very supportive, but we do have an issue with CW&C Council itself. Some long while ago Highways drew up a proposal for speed limits through the forest (where families with small children and dogs regularly cross a 60mph road), and along Abbey Lane and Stable Lane. Delamere and the other parish councils supported this strongly. CW&C Council then introduced a new policy, that no such changes to speed limits will be carried out unless local communities are prepared to contribute to the cost. As a result, Highways have told us that they are not allowed to implement their own proposals without funding from the parish councils along the route. We do sympathise with CW&C's need to save money, but consider their handling of this serious road safety issue to be totally wrong. We have taken this up with our Ward Councillors.

Parish council meetings can sometimes get quite exciting! Do come along if you would like to join in, and remember, in the Spring we will be needing nominations for two new councils (Willington, and Delamere and Oakmere).

Oakmere Parish Council Chairman's Letter

Hello again, this is Bill McGibbon, chair of Oakmere Parish Council. Oakmere Parish Council welcomes Ceri Rothwell, recently coopted as a Councillor.

The Community Governance Review process is now complete, as far as Oakmere & Delamere are concerned. The two parishes will be amalgamated into a single parish with two Wards. We know that Delamere's boundaries will change significantly, while Oakmere's boundaries will remain largely intact. The detail of the precise boundaries of Delamere and Oakmere are now known. The two councils will be dissolved on the 31st March 2015. An interim council made up of CWaC Councillors and a number of outgoing Delamere Councillors and Oakmere Councillors will form an "interim" council, to provide continuity from the 1st April 2015 until the new D&O Council is formed after the elections in May 2015.

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Some Oakmere residents may have had letters from United Utilities (UU), asking for access to their land, to facilitate a survey they are conducting. Recently UU asked for a meeting with OPC to explain what this survey related to. The EU has introduced new regulations, the Water Framework Directive, requiring amongst other things, that water companies meet improved standards for purification of water being returned into water courses from sewage treatment works. They also have to improve their carbon footprint by reducing their energy use. Another factor, the sewage treatment works in Northwich has been increased in size and is currently under-used, which is making the works less efficient than it could be. Oakmere and Cuddington currently have their own sewage treatment works. The UU plan is to introduce a pipeline from Oakmere to Cuddington and from Cuddington to Northwich. The two sewage treatment works at Oakmere and Cuddington will be turned into pumping stations to feed to Northwich Treatment Works, which will be upgraded further. This means that no purified waste water will be returned into Oakmere water courses and there will be no HGV journeys associated with the removal of sludge in our area. As you can imagine, UU have a substantial sewer network in place and the new pipeline will connect the existing networks, so there will not be a completely new pipeline over the whole distance. UU are only part way through their design phase of this project. A lot more work is needed to decide on the exact route of any new sections of pipeline. The design will minimise the uphill pumped sections of pipeline as this uses energy and maximise the downhill sections that use gravity. So, we can expect there will be some disruption on Oakmere's road network during this project. UU say they are very experienced in handling road restrictions and assure us that they will be kept to a minimum and for as short a timescale as they can achieve. This is early days in this project so very approximate timescales are: Design – 2015; Implementation – 2016/17; Online – 2018.

Crown Estates outline planning application, on proposals for a residential development on the Marley Tile site has been approved. We can expect that Crown Estates will select a building contractor and start work on a detailed plan for the site.

This is the first summer that the Oakmere Way has been open and it is proving very popular

with walkers, horse riders and cyclists. As we move into winter, a couple of sections of the route are becoming quite muddy and difficult to traverse. The Mid Cheshire Bridleways Association is looking at improving these sections of the route.

The planning application for the Forestry Commission redevelopment of the Linmere visitors centre and Delamere Forest cabin development is awaiting the outcome of a public inquiry. This outcome is due to be announced this month (November 2014).

The deployment of Superfast Broadband is now available on Station Road, but remains tantalisingly unavailable for parts of Oakmere, as I write. Further announcements can be found on the Connecting Cheshire website, www.connectingcheshire.org.uk.



Forest mossland restoration

Earlier this year Katie Piercy gave us an article about the Cheshire Wildlife Trust's Lost Mosses project in Delamere Forest, which is bringing back to life some of its lost mossland habitats. Since then the project has been moving on apace, and Katie and two of her colleagues in the Wildlife Trust (Chris Meredith and Heather Hulse) have been kind enough to take a few of us on a guided tour.



Doolittle Moss

To get a glimpse of what the Trust has been doing, park at Barnsbridge Gate and head for Blakemere Lake, with Doolittle Moss down in the dip on your left. Keep on around the dip until you find a turn to the left off the main path, which takes you down to the southern edge of the Moss. Take care to leave only footprints,

and be careful where you leave them, as this is one of the main restoration areas. When Spring comes, keep an eye open for dragonflies, and see if you can spot a white-faced darter. This is one of the rarest dragonflies in the UK, and was once a special feature of Black Lake. It had disappeared by 2003, after the ecology of the lake had been inadvertently disrupted though the use of limestone chippings on a nearby track.

As an alternative habitat for the species the Lost Mosses project has been improving Doolittle Moss by restoring the water level and reducing the area of moss raft, and has introduced whitefaced darter larvae from similar mosses in Staffordshire and Shropshire. Many of these have already matured into adults, but 2015 will be the first year in which Delamere dragonflies will have produced more Delamere dragonflies. Even then there will be a lot more work to be done, but it is hoped that the population of white-faced darters in Delamere will be fully self-sustaining within the next ten years. By then they should also be back at Black Lake, whose ecology is already recovering. Wildlife Trust aims to create dragonfly corridors between Doolittle and other moss pools in the forest by thinning out the trees.



Green hairstreak

The white-faced darter is not the only species getting a helping hand from the project. The restoration work is extending the area suitable





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for the amazing little round-leaved sundew, which lives on insects that it entices with a sugary coating on its leaves. On our guided walk Katie's eagle eyes found one for us on Black Lake. Other rarities that appear to be benefitting include the green hairstreak butterfly, spotted in an area of newly created heathland, the aromatic bog myrtle, and the highly specialist bog rosemary. The Lost Mosses project plans to put up information boards covering these and other features of the area's wildlife.

The project depends heavily on volunteers to do much of the work, and on donations to cover the costs. Katie and her colleague Vicky Nall have themselves raised over £500 through a sponsored run in the forest (see separate article). Getting stuck in for wildlife

Katie Piercy and Vicky Nall of the Cheshire Wildlife Trust take their work seriously. Both have worked on the Trust's projects in Delamere Forest, and to help keep the projects going they have raised well over £500 is sponsorships by participating in a Hellrunner endurance event in the forest. "I always say I like getting stuck into my work", says Katie, "but this took things to a whole new level."



Made it!

Already keen runners, Katie and Vicky decided they couldn't miss the opportunity to raise money by taking on the aptly-named hellish event, as it passed many of the areas in Delamere Forest that are the current focus of Wildlife Trust projects. The Trust worked closely with the Hellrunner event team to ensure that the race left no lasting damage to areas of the forest that are in the process of restoration. "Events like this are an unexpected way to get

people interested in mossland habitats" Katie tells us. "To most people they are a mystery, too wet to explore, slightly threatening and scary. In the future we want to find other ways for the public to enjoy the mosslands too, giving them a chance to learn about the fascinating wildlife that lives there, and turn the idea that they are uninviting and gloomy on its head. We'd like to say a big thank you to everyone who supported us on the day and pledged sponsorship for this crazy challenge." Out of almost 2,000 runners who were crazy enough to take it on, the two wildlife enthusiasts came an impressive 706th and 707th.

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

Broadband update

Superfast broadband got its first mention in these pages two years ago, when the Connecting Cheshire Partnership was launched. Thanks in no small measure to the efforts of Dr Bob Clipperton, who led the local effort to make sure that our part of Cheshire didn't get left out, it has now arrived! Fibre optic connections were made available from the Kelsall exchange a few months ago. Now they are also available from the Sandiway exchange, except for two small areas around Farm Road and Stonyford Lane, marked on the Connecting Cheshire map (www.connectingcheshire.org.uk) as 'under evaluation'.

The new service isn't automatic so to take advantage of it you will need to get your broadband provider to upgrade you, or switch to a new provider. The Connecting Cheshire website lists over 20 potential providers, each

with its own website, each offering various options in various different packages, some with fibre connections and some not, each with its own special offer of short term prices to entice you in. If you decide to switch you will need to cancel your old contract and arrange the transfer (see http://consumers.ofcom.org.uk/internet for advice). Be warned. Any of the providers may try and sell you more than you want, so finding the best deal for you may not be easy!

Mains Gas update

Last summer, Fulcrum, (the company who installed the mains gas pipe to Wainhomes in Oakmere), finally gave us, (a small group of CW&C reps. some local Parish Councillors and Ward Councillors looking at local mains gas installation), figures per household/business for pipeline connection to those side areas of Oakmere not close enough now to be directly connected. These are their budget estimates for new main pipelines and for services and meters at each property.

Project 1 – Waste Lane/Mere Crescent, 51 properties, £3,097.00 per property.

Project 2 – Stonyford Lane, 16 properties, £5,167.00 per property.

Project 3 - Farm Road/New House Farm, 14 properties, £3,114.00 per property.

Project 4 – Hogshead Lane, 40 properties, £1,804.00 per property.

Project 6 – Overdale Lane, 8 properties, £13,486.00 per property.

These figures depend on 100% uptake so that if say, only 50% of households in any area wish to get connected, then their cost will be double those shown per household. On top of that is the cost of a new boiler etc.. Fulcrum agreed to contact every related household in Oakmere to determine their interest but they don't seem to have done that yet.

It cannot be denied that these costs are discouraging. However, there is clear evidence that mains gas is the cheapest form of energy, and the government has assisted new boiler schemes. In a competitive energy market it is also possible that some meters might be supplied and installed for free. The informal mains gas group referred to above are also looking to see if support funding is available



from local or national government. We will keep you updated on any significant progress.

With respect to the main housing groups in Delamere, any mains gas connection depends entirely on whether the Marley Tiles development goes ahead. We have been assured by CW&C that Crown Estates have agreed to pay for a pipeline to the proposed development, which has recently been given outline planning approval. If and when that pipe is installed, we will begin a similar process to that for Oakmere, for properties along and off Station Road.

Finally, we have been told by Fulcrum in many meetings that properties within about 20 metres of the main pipeline should be connectable essentially for free. However, a resident who lives within that limit has recently applied for connection, and after some considerable confusion, was eventually quoted a ludicrous connection cost of many thousands of pounds. The above mains gas group are examining this anomaly, which may also have severe implications for the proposed Delamere pipe.

Station Bridge Pedestrian Issues.

Over many years, there have been two main proposals to improve pedestrian and passenger safety over Delamere Station Road Bridge. Firstly, there is the proposal to build a separate pedestrian bridge on the Station side of the roadbridge wall. All official meetings have agreed that such a new pedestrian bridge would be the safest option, but of course it is the most expensive. No appropriate authority, such as CW&C Highways, Network Rail or Northern Rail will fund such a bridge. CW&C Highways came up with a cheaper proposal to transfer the existing narrow pavement/footway on the east side of the road bridge to the west side (but still on the road) and this has been on CW&C's books for several years. Both proposals would include a new footway in front of the caravan park and a completely new footway sloping down to the Station car park entrance.

Over the last couple of years, discussions have been held with the Department of Transport, Network Rail, and the Office of Rail Regulation to determine whose legal responsibility it is to construct a separate bridge. Network Rail technically 'own' the whole road-bridge through agreements with the Dept. of Transport, but CW&C are responsible for changes on it and therefore for any new footways.

Through the Office of Rail Regulation and the House of Commons Transport Committee, efforts have been made to basically order Network Rail to construct a separate bridge, but both of those organisations say they do not get involved with specific local issues. There is, therefore an impasse on the separate pedestrian bridge option but MP Stephen O'Brien has been asked to discuss this further with Network and Northern Rail's Senior management. One last approach may be made through the Dept. of Transport, who fund Network Rail and the Office of Rail Regulation and issue rail operating franchises. CW&C have had no monies to complete either option, and are relying on getting contributions from either or both of the Marley development and the proposed Forestry Commission development, but neither of these would be available for at least 1-2 years. Efforts to get CW&C Highways to construct just the footway outside of the Caravan Park have also been fruitless.

Carols at the Stores

The Village Choir (made up of volunteers, Delamere Stores customers and passers by) will be singing again this Christmas Eve between 10am at 12 noon outside the shop in Station Road, Delamere. It should be fun, but wrap up warm. In Victorian costume or modern garb all are welcome to sing for a while or just listen. 
