



# Letter from the Rector

July 2015

Dear Friends

### **One Solitary Life**

While still a young man the tide of popular opinion turned against him. His friends, the twelve who had learned so much from him and had promised him their undying loyalty ran away and left him. He went through a mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for his clothing, the only property he had on earth. When he was dead he was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

Yet I am well within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, all the parliaments that ever sat and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of men and women on this earth as much as that one solitary life.



### Parish Council news

Delamere and Oakmere Parish Council Chairman's Letter

#### New Parish Council - or Reunited at Last?

After so many years living apart but separated only by Station Road, Abbey Lane and Middlewich Road, Oakmere and Delamere have officially become one.

The original estrangement, occurring when civil parishes were created in 1866, gave rise to a number of anomalies. The school, the post office and the community centre are all in Delamere; even Oakmere Methodist Church is in Delamere. The post office, now in the Community Centre and previously at Delamere Stores, was once housed in Crown Cottages in Oakmere. St. Peter's Church, founded in 1817, has always remained aloof from these secular schisms: the ecclesiastical parish has always covered the whole of Delamere and Oakmere.

All this might make it appear that Delamere, with a larger population than Oakmere, has had more parish council matters to attend to than Oakmere. Until recently that may have been the case — but things have changed and changed quite significantly: most of Delamere, with large areas of forest and farmland, is designated as an "Area of Special County Value"; Oakmere, with the recent and ongoing development at Fourways and the proposed development at the Marley site has become the focus of considerable attention with Delamere its quiet country neighbour.

All this is, of course, a simplification: both councils have always had plenty to occupy their attention, but from now onwards the two are united and this can only be a positive step. Much business at the early meetings has been of an administrative and financial nature: each old parish council, for instance, had its own bank account; now the old accounts have been discontinued and a new one opened. Such were the apparent difficulties that I was left wondering whether we should have entered into some kind of pre-nuptial agreement. However, all the technical complexities were surmounted thanks to the efficiency and expertise of our clerk Joanne Monks.

As a result of the boundary changes Delamere has lost its westernmost part, in part to Kelsall and in part to the newly-formed Willington Parish Council. One consequence has been the departure of five former councillors. This has left vacancies in the new joint council. When the new council began it was short of three members, one from the Oakmere ward and two from Delamere.

If you are considering standing as a parish council member you may stand for either ward, provided you live in the parish (or within three miles) or are employed in the parish. Ask any existing member for further advice. They will tell you, I am sure, that duties are far from onerous, but playing an active role in the life of the community can be most rewarding.

# A Grand Day Out to a Royal Garden Party – Summer 2015

The oft quoted adage that something is 'like buses - none for ages then three at once' aptly describes events this summer. Reminiscences of one visit to a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace would be good, two even better, but three is amazing! As our recollections are similar we have combined them into one account.

From the moment the stiff white invitation plopped through the letter box grandly engraved 'The Lord Chamberlain is commanded by Her Majesty to invite ..... 'What to wear was the first decision to be made. The accompanying literature stated that day dresses, lounge or morning suit, national dress or cassocks could be worn with hats de rigueur for the ladies. Not certain as to what constituted 'national dress' for Delamere we all opted for day dresses and lounge suits.

When the much awaited day arrived we made our way to London and the palace, some by coach and some on Mr Branson's taxi from Crewe. We joined a good natured queue and at the given moment we were allowed in through the gates; passing through the front door and two large beautifully decorated rooms and out onto the Main Terrace.



Huge marquees serving afternoon tea were set up all down one side of the enormous lawn with a bandstand either end where two military bands played throughout the afternoon. There were about eight thousand people at each event and there was opportunity for many interesting conversations with people from all over the country indeed from across the globe.

The National Anthem heralded the arrival of the Royal party and over the three events we saw Her Majesty the Queen, Prince Philip, the Duchess of Cornwall, the Countess of Wessex, Princess Alexandra, the Duchess of Gloucester, Prince & Princess Michael of Kent, Princess Beatrice and Princess Ann. The "Royals" slowly made their way amongst us frequently stopping to chat the pathway to their tea marquee being designated by Yeoman Warders resplendent in red livery.



Then it was time for tea once more we queued but it was all good natured and somehow very British. The food was delicious finger rolls and dainty sandwiches, tiny cakes and tartlets some of the little cakes even had a royal crest iced onto them with tea or iced coffee to drink.

We were free to wander at will around the Palace grounds the cerise and vermillion rhododendrons were stunning as was the lake, the rose garden and the arboretum.

Towards the close of the afternoon the royal party made their way back to the palace and for Katherine and David there was a fairy tale ending. Because of her difficulty with walking Katherine had acquired a 'rollator' for the occasion and making their way to the exit she and David came upon a parade of wheelchairs and scooters backed up against the wall an usher showed them to a space and presently the Queen arrived and addressed every trio of chariots. "Are you enjoying yourselves?" she said and Katherine blurted "yes thank you, very much". "How was the tea?" "Very good". Then Prince Philip "You know what happens next? We blow a whistle and you have to race for the gate." Then Princess Ann deep voiced and concerned if the wind was too cool. After the royal party had gone it was time for all of us to make our way through the palace and into the courtyard and out past guards on sentry duty back to reality. Our grand day out was nearly over.

It was such a special and not-to-be-repeated day but somehow it all felt familiar the people we had met the sights we had seen it was as though it is all part of our collective DNA, part of our heritage and tradition; for us we had 'been up to London and visited the Queen.' Now we have wonderful memories and of course the stiff white invitation card now in perpetuity on the mantelpiece.

# Dennis Gore, a true man of Delamere

On the hot summer morning of 1<sup>st</sup> July Delamere Church was packed. People had come to pay their respects to one of Delamere's best-known citizens, a man whom many of us had known for all our lives. Dennis Gore had spent all his 89 years living in Delamere, a fact of which he was rightly proud.

David and Helen, two of his grandchildren, paid a most moving tribute to their grandad; they spoke of his own family, Dennis being the eldest of four brothers (he also had four sisters), of his longstanding association with Delamere Church (he was a member of the Parochial Church Council), of his post as stationmaster at Delamere Station and of his involvement in local sport, but what shone through their talk was Dennis's love of and pride in his family (his son and daughter-in-law, three grandchildren and four great-grandsons) and of their evident affection for him.

Like Dennis, Freda, Dennis's future wife, was Delamere born and they first met aged five when they started at Delamere School back in the days when Mr. Fugler was headmaster and Mrs. Lightfoot was the infant teacher.

Late in the war eighteen-year old Dennis served in the Dorset Regiment and was involved in the disastrous battle for Arnhem in September 1944. He was captured and spent the last eight months of the war in Stalag IVB near the Polish border, before it was liberated by the Russians. Ever after Dennis was reluctant to speak of his experiences as a p.o.w.

Soon after the war Dennis and Freda married. They spent part of their early married life in the newly-built houses in Watling Drive before moving to Frith Avenue.

Many of those attending his funeral would have known Dennis through sport. He played football and bowls for Delamere and cricket for both Delamere and Oakmere. As a talented player in his early teens Dennis played for Delamere Cricket Club whose ground was at Abbey Wood. The club didn't survive the war and few now can recall its existence.

But it was as a founder member and captain of Oakmere Cricket Club in the early 50s that Dennis Gore will be remembered by so many. His approach to captaincy was, to put it mildly, authoritarian. The slightest lapse in concentration at the wicket or in the field would earn a sharp rebuke. Many of us younger hopefuls were very wary of him.

When I started teaching I was given charge of my school's Under 13 Cricket XI. When I took them on their general conduct in the field was unimpressive: the players loafed around hands in pockets, gazing around them, chatting to their mates – not what one might expect of a proper cricket team. "What," I thought as I looked on this depressing sight, "What on earth would Dennis Gore have made of this lot!" Thus inspired I set about drilling the boys in the way I remembered and by the end of the season we had, if not the most naturally gifted, at least one of the most enthusiastic and willing sides in the district We won all but one of our matches that summer. For Dennis's excellent example I was forever grateful.

Dennis's post-funeral gathering was at Oakmere Cricket Club in Overdale Lane. The "pavilion" of the 1950s, little more than a shed in a field, has now become a most impressive building, one well able to accommodate the many who gathered there on that hot July afternoon and to do so in style. What more appropriate tribute could there have been to a man who had given so much to the club and to the community!

The club was founded in 1910 when eleven local businessmen got together to raise sufficient funds to design and build the course and clubhouse on land leased from the Crown (the freehold was purchased some 50 years later). The club's first and only President was Hugh Grosvenor, the 2nd Duke of Westminster. One of the founder members was the prominent local architect Alfred Powles, who designed the stunning clubhouse with its traditional Cheshire black and white exterior. The original clubhouse, built over 100 years ago, has been substantially improved in recent years.



The celebrated golf architect Herbert Fowler was engaged to design the course, and a team of local farm workers was recruited to carry out the work. Fowler used the contours of the land to create a course that would test every aspect of a golfer's ability, with rolling fairways interspersed with heather and gorse, and fast, subtle greens. As a result the course offers a

fair but tough challenge to visitors and members alike.

Since its foundation Delamere has built strong links with the County, hosting the inaugural Cheshire County Meeting in 1921. In addition the annual Doris Chambers Ladies County Competition and the County Boys' Championship have been held at the club for over 30 years.

In 2012 the club took the momentous decision to strengthen the course and reinstate its original heathland character. The renowned golf architects Mackenzie and Ebert, who had recently completed the remodelling of Royal Lytham and St Anne's for the Open Championship, were commissioned to carry out the task. The work commenced in late 2012 and is now complete. Every bunker has been returned to the original Fowler design and all of the greens have been increased in size to provide additional options and run-off areas.



As a result the century-old character of Delamere has been reinstated, and a new Blue Course of over 6600 yards including 8 new tees is available for County and National events.

# The village school

It is a long while since the school featured in the newsletter, and as it is now being printed by them at a very modest cost, it's high time we had a reminder of how fortunate we are. The school was threatened with closure in 2007, with only 43 pupils, but thanks in large measure to an intervention from Alex and John Timpson, plus the skill and determination of head teacher Steve Docking, it is now thriving again.

Delamere school dates back to 1846, when it was built on an acre of forest land donated by the Crown as a Church of England primary school 'for the education of the children of the poor'. Its original building remains one of the most distinctive architectural features of the parish.



When closure was threatened the Timpsons approached the Director of Children's Services, arguing that smaller schools are needed, and offering a grant of £150,000 to expand the curriculum and help establish the school as a centre of excellence for others to follow. The extra lessons included art, music, theatre, cooking, nature studies in the forest, and opportunities to go canoeing and orienteering. Within three years the school had become the smallest in the country to achieve outstanding status in its OFSTED report, pupil numbers

were up by nearly 50%, and the scene was set for a major modernisation programme. In 2011 the school became Delamere Church of England Primary Academy, and grants totalling nearly £1.5 million were obtained from the Education Funding Agency to completely remodel the old building and construct the new classrooms and the new hall.





With its extra facilities the school now has 168 pupils in seven classes from Delamere, Oakmere and surrounding areas, with an imaginative curriculum and a wide range of extra-curricular activities. To cap it all, in two of the past three years its Key Stage 2 results have put it top of the league tables in Cheshire West and Chester, and in the top 50 nationally.

# Two hundred holiday lodges planned for Fourways quarry

Plans are afoot to put 200 holiday lodges on the site of the former sand quarry at Fourways, along with an entrance/amenity building and a sailing club. The landowner, William Fergusson of Oakmere House, has submitted a planning application to Cheshire West and Chester Council for the holiday lodges, while the sailing club and amenity building would come later under separate planning applications.

If the application is approved it is likely to be at least ten years before the development is complete. Between 15 and 20 lodges are planned for the first year, followed by similar numbers in each of the following years.



The proposed lodges are similar in design to those in the nearby Oakmere Lodge Country Park, next to The Lounge restaurant. Of the 50 lodges that were proposed in the planning application for Oakmere Park, which was approved in 2003, twelve have been built so far.

The Fourways site was earmarked for tourist and recreation development in Vale Royal Borough Council's planning policy, and the designation has been retained in the recently adopted Cheshire West and Chester local plan. The policy specifies suitable uses for the site as "non-engine powered water sports (sailing, sailboarding, canoeing and fishing) and strictly ancillary development (water sports club with changing facilities and a fishing club) and timber chalets". A proposal to include a hotel in the development was withdrawn on the Council's advice.



The lodges would be built on the north eastern part of the quarry site, with about 60 along the lake shore and the rest in semi-wooded areas behind them.



The main body of the peninsula is identified as open recreational space, with lodges on its eastern shore and the sailing club on the western shore. Access to the site would be through the existing quarry entrance on Chester Road, with the entrance/amenity building in the neck of the peninsula.

The land to the east between the proposed development and Hogshead Lane, from which sand was extracted by dry-working, will be restored to woodland by the Forestry Commission.



Since quarrying ceased many birds have occupied the site, and a series of surveys has been carried out as part of the planning application. Birds showing nesting behaviour included Canada and greylag geese, great crested grebe, grey and pied wagtail, heron, kestrel, lapwing, meadow pipit, mistle thrush, oystercatcher, reed bunting, sand martin, shelduck, skylark, snipe, song thrush, sparrow hawk, tufted duck, wheatear and willow warbler. Wintering birds observed in and around the site included gadwall, golden eye, green woodpecker, smew and wigeon.




