

New Rector for St. Peter's Church

After many years of sharing a vicar with Ashton Hayes, Delamere has its own rector for the first time since 2000 when, with the departure of Rev Paul Reynolds, the rectory was let by the diocese.

Since the retirement last summer of Rev Brian Perkes, who was based in Ashton Hayes, both parishes have been without an Anglican priest.

Delamere churchgoers were resigned to the fact that this was the way things were going to stay and the days of having our own incumbent living in our own rectory were gone forever.

And then a surprising thing happened. At a Parochial Church Council meeting last autumn members were told of a change of heart by the diocese. It had been decided that, after a lapse of more than eleven years, we were once again to have our own rector – and living in our own rectory.

Early euphoria was tempered by the realisation that in these days Church of England vicars (or rectors for that matter*) are none too easy to find. A costly advertisement in the *Church Times* produced no response and for some months prospects looked bleak.

Meantime Mary Carter and David Unsworth, the churchwardens, had managed to find clergy and lay readers to take all the services from August last year until after Easter – quite an achievement.

Then in January came the good news that an applicant for the vacancy had been found. The PCC were invited to meet her the day before her interview with the Bishop of Chester and the two churchwardens.

The interview was successful!

Our new rector comes from the Wirral and will be moving with her husband to Delamere Rectory in the late spring.

May Induction

Rev. Elaine Ollman's induction as Rector of Delamere will take place at St. Peter's Church on Thursday 24th May at 7.30pm.

*Why does Delamere (like Tarporley) have a rector and not a vicar? The difference is lost somewhere in the mists of ecclesiastical time, but it seems to have had something to do with the way tithes were once paid. In the past parishioners paid a tenth (tithe) of their income to the church. Those were the days! But don't tell PCC Treasurer David Bennett!

Asked for a clear explanation of the distinction between the two terms, a learned theologian recently provided an answer to this conundrum: a vicar, he said, lives in a vicarage; a rector lives in a rectory!

Can anyone come up with a more satisfactory explanation?

So here I am with a blank sheet of paper; what shall I write about – I thought I might do a piece on 'The State of the Global Economy with Particular Reference to the Ongoing Difficulties in the Euro Zone', or maybe 'The Perceived Disparity Between the UK Extradition Treaty with America Compared to That With Other Countries'. However, I thought I might leave those for another time and I turned to my late mother's scrapbook.

Now this is no well ordered affair neatly arranged but is a positive jumble of cuttings and jottings. Interesting things she'd heard on the radio or read in a book, the text from her tear-off calendar, observations on life, a recipe here and a scrap of knitting pattern there. On one page, sandwiched between the aide memoir for recalling when the clocks change – 'Spring forward, Fall back' and the impact temperature in degrees centigrade (Celsius) - '5, 10 and 21 - winter, spring and summer sun' there is pasted the poem by M L Haskins that King George V1 quoted in his Christmas broadcast to the nation in 1939

"I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year, 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'
And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness, and put your hand into the Hand of God.
That shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way.""

Brian and I are looking forward to coming to live in Delamere and sharing in worship at St Peter's, meeting new people and becoming involved in the life of the local community. However, for us coming and for you waiting for our arrival is a little like 'treading into the unknown' uncertain of what lies ahead. But as the poem says if we 'put our hand into the hand of God' if we trust him for the future he has planned then He is all the light we need, His way is the safest.

End of the Road for Harringtons

Founded in the 1920s and by far the oldest caravan dealers in the country, Harringtons Leisure Centre was for many years a thriving and popular business. Then along came Discover Leisure who bought out some fifteen caravan dealerships up and down the country.

It was clear some time ago that all was not well with the new owners. Many long-established members of the workforce had left, rumours abounded about the financial health of the company and by 2010 Discover had disposed of most of the companies they had taken over only two or three years earlier.

The Delamere branch was one of the last to go, but the writing was on the wall long before its demise. When in October last year Discover went into administration, some 240 employees lost their jobs – nearly 70 of them at Delamere.

Few will find any sympathy for the perpetrators of this collapse; any such feelings should be reserved for the local businesses that have suffered as a consequence and especially for the many workers who have lost their jobs at what is a particularly difficult time.

Motorcycle Accessory Retailers Takes Over Harringtons Site

It was announced in February that the vacant Harringtons site had been bought by J&S Accessories Ltd. of Northwich.

Motorcycle accessory company J&S, which began life in Northwich, has 12 outlets in the UK, from Hamilton in Scotland to Plymouth in the South West as well as a large online business.

With the departure of Discover it was feared that the empty site would turn into yet another housing estate. The good news now is that a thriving retail company is to set up shop in Oakmere.

J&S plan to move not only their store, currently in the middle of Northwich, but also their head office at present located in Kingfisher Court (behind B&Q) to the Oakmere site. Meantime their warehouse, situated behind the old office, is to be relocated to Northampton.

J&S hope that with the excellent facilities at Oakmere it will become the largest outlet with the best range of motorcycle clothing in the UK.

I spoke recently to Peter Lynch, the company accountant, about the planned move. He told me that it is anticipated that some 25 employees will move out from the Northwich site and office. This does not include staff at the on-site café/ restaurant, which is due to reopen.

Asked about other plans for the site, he agreed that, although J&S now owned the whole site, it was larger than was needed for their retail business, but, despite numerous rumours, they were at present concentrating on the move and were keeping an open mind as to further possibilities. There is, however, no truth in the

rumour of an outside go-kart track being developed, but the continuation of caravan sales has not been ruled out.

In addition to clothing and accessories J&S sells Kawasaki machines and may acquire further motorcycle franchises in the future.

He assured me that the company was concerned about their image and maintaining good relations with the locality. Motorcyclists' average age, he told me, is in the mid-40s, rather countering the stereotypical image many have of bikers.

J&S are looking to open in late March/early April and are planning an Open Weekend on 21^{st} and 22^{nd} April. It is hoped that local residents will attend what sounds like an interesting and fun event for all ages. R.

New Classrooms at Delamere Academy



The new classrooms should be ready after Easter

Anyone passing Delamere School recently must have taken a second look at what has suddenly appeared in the school grounds. I was shown round the new building as it was nearing completion and couldn't help being affected by Headmaster Steve Docking's enthusiasm for what is happening and his plans for the future.

The whole structure will be cedar-clad and will contain two spacious classrooms, each with a kitchen area, toilets and an entrance lobby. The classrooms are for Years 1 and 2.

Pupils were asked to ome up with ideas for the grounds to the north side of the building. These were then presented to Urban Forestry Group, who incorporated many of the suggestions into an exciting and ambitious plan for the area.

The proposed development will include a 14' x 8' polycarbonate greenhouse, a planting area for school gardening projects, a seating are with six wooden planters and timber trellis archway, a bird table and study area with tables and an imaginative Diamond Jubilee theme planting area with a **60** as its centrepiece.

A pathway made of block pavers is to run through the new garden and there will be a chance to become a part of the school's history by buying a block. Forest Furore

"Threat" posed by Holiday Homes

News of plans for the siting of up to 78 holiday homes in Delamere Forest has caused an almighty rumpus in certain quarters locally.

Forest Holidays was established in 2006 as a joint venture between the Forestry Commission and the Camping and Caravanning Club. The company has sites in forests throughout the country, including Sherwood Forest and the Forest of Dean.

The enterprise has proved so successful that *Forest Holidays* is seeking to expand into other areas – including Delamere. The company's plans were first mentioned at a meeting at Linmere nearly two years ago, when local forestry officials and representatives of local community interests were invited to meet with a representative of *Forest Holidays*.

Following the recent threat to the future of Delamere Forest it has become increasingly clear that, if it is to survive in its present form and avoid any future threat of privatisation, the forest will have to show that it is financially viable. Initiatives such as concerts, car parking and Christmas tree sales, as well as the traditional income from timber sales, though important, cannot on their own realise sufficient income. It's all very well having some romantic vision of the forest as an idyllic place for birds and squirrels, unspoilt by man, but the simple truth is that this large tract of woodland so loved by the thousands of visitors who flock here every year needs constant care and maintenance. And this costs money.

As someone who was heavily involved in the *Save Delamere Forest* campaign last year I am only too aware of the importance of the forest to people from all over the north west and how important it is to keep the forest open to all-comers, be they ramblers, horse riders, cyclists or even people who would like the opportunity to stay for a few nights in an area which we who live nearby are so lucky to have on our doorstep.

A recently-formed action group opposed to the planned development has given its website the arrestingly melodramatic title "Campaign Against the Destruction of Delamere" – not just Delamere

Forest, mind, but the whole, it would appear, of Delamere itself, as though there were some evil force at work threatening the annihilation of our village. Either that or the campaign's founders are so out of touch with the locality that they are unaware that such a place as Delamere exists independent of the forest.

These activists appear to be driven by a mass epidemic of ill-informed hysteria. Convinced that "thousands of trees" have already been felled with the sole purpose of clearing space for holiday homes and that "hundreds of cars" will drive through the forest to reach them, no amount of reasoning or evidence to the contrary will persuade them otherwise.

So overcome with what they see as righteous indignation are they that these people just don't want to listen. When Adrian Burn of *Forest Holidays* attempted at a recent public meeting to address the concerns voiced by the audience his every explanation was met with jeers and derision.

All the objections that have been raised *can* be answered. Not here, there just isn't room, but if you have concerns about the impact of traffic, about the location of the holiday homes site, about tree felling and any other possible damage to the environment, about proximity to existing homes, about *anything* to do with the project, visit the exhibition at Linmere, talk to one of the people there and listen to what they have to say.

Behind this campaign lies perhaps the most virulent form of *nimbyism* – a phenomenon that manifests itself from time to time in rural areas. One militant protestor complained that he has found the area near the Visitors' Centre "often unpleasantly heaving" (this no doubt with the masses who come from towns and cities for recreation and who helped save the forest from privatisation by signing our petition last year).

Another protester, when told that the introduction of holiday homes could well result in jobs for local people, retorted, "Why do we care about benefits to the local community?" (sic)

Say no more, dear Nimby – You've told us quite enough!

Local Buses

Many years ago there used to be two companies whose buses passed through Delamere.

The green Crosville buses, which served western Cheshire and the whole of North Wales, were based in Chester. They ran a regular service from Chester to Winsford (and on to Middlewich and Sandbach). Buses turned right at the Abbey Arms, then left at the Fishpool. They would then go right at Sandy Brow and detour through Little Budworth before returning to the A54 at The Shrewsbury Arms and then on to Winsford.

The red North Western buses (belonging to the North Western Road Car Company) were based in Stockport and served the eastern part of the county. They ran from Northwich bus terminal to Chester.

More recently our only buses were those on the Northwich-Chester route and when Arriva withdrew this service a few years ago the prospects looked bleak. Fortunately GHA Coaches of Wrexham came to our rescue taking over the hourly service from Arriva. Even better was to follow and we now enjoy an excellent half-hourly service to and from both towns, though the continuation of this service must surely depend on the continuation of free bus passes to senior citizens. Let's hope these continue!

New Service to Winsford

Last September, however, another service was introduced in the area. D&G Bus, based in Crewe, now run from Chester to Crewe via Winsford, so you can once again catch a bus from Delamere to Winsford. In theory, that is. But there's a snag. After leaving Kelsall and approaching Organsdale the buses fork right at the points taking the A54, thereby by-passing Delamere almost completely.

I rang a man at D&G and asked why the Winsford buses couldn't go via the Abbey Arms as of yore. He was sympathetic and said it was worth considering, but added ruefully that the service was not doing particularly well since no one seemed to want to go to Winsford...

I was reminded of one of my favourite Stanley Holloway poems that tells of how Old Ted the Boatman used to row people across the Mersey from Runcorn to Widnes at "per tuppence per person per trip"...

'But as nobody wanted to go either place Well the trade it weren't any too good'.

Sorry, Winsford!

On the return journey it should be possible to alight at the Fishpool – or even the end of Stoney Lane. Whether you can flag a bus down on the outward journey... it's up to you.







Letter from Delamere Parish Council

Delamere Parish Council has vacancies for 2 Parish Councillors.

Parish Councils are the first tier of local government and have an important role in representing the interests of their communities as well as defining and developing projects that will benefit and improve the quality of life and the local environment.

Delamere Parish Council has recently successfully lobbied CWAC to lower the speed limit on the A556, managed to get a grit bin located on Eddisbury Hill and has invested in environmental works to clear and maintain Waste Lane pond for the enjoyment of everyone.

We are shortly about to hold our first Community Event, 7.00pm Monday 21st May at Delamere Community Centre where we have brought together representatives from various local organisation including Cheshire Police, Cheshire West & Chester Council, HomeWatch. Delamere Community Association, the Forestry Commission and Delamere School to discuss current projects. We will also be seeking people's views on the future use of the playing field at Frith Avenue, talking about our plans to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee and starting the process of putting together a Parish or Neighbour Plan. Given the Government's Localism Agenda and the recent changes to Planning Legislation this will be an important document and its formation will enable the residents of Delamere to have their say on the future shape and development of the area.

Delamere Parish Council is not party political. The council meet monthly, meeting taking place at either Delamere School or Delamere Community Centre; meetings starting at 7.30pm.

Development of the Old Courthouse and Police Station

Built in 1897 (before which the court was held at the nearby Abbey Arms) the Police Station has lain disused and derelict since 1987.

The current owner of the premises, Manchester restaurateur Gerry Yeung of Yang Sing restaurant in Princess Street, has been looking for some time to develop the property and recently engaged local architect Nicola Gibson of Oakmere.

Nicola has produced an imaginative design that retains the character of the original building. It involves the preservation and renovation of the existing courthouse into nine residential units and in addition the construction of ten units on land to the side.

The new houses are intended to have elements of the style of the Courthouse and to fit in with the style of other buildings in the locality (such as the row of Crown Cottages further along the A556).

Plans have been submitted and are awaiting approval from the council.

Delamere Forest Wins Top Award

The Forestry Commission at Delamere recently received a top award at the *Landscape Institute Awards*.

The Old Pale Community Woodland at Delamere Forest was the winner in the *design over 5ha* category.

The judges described it as "an outstanding example of large-scale landscape". The strong design concept responded well to the historic, ecological and geological sensitivities of the site. The panel particularly liked the manipulation of views through the woodland, guiding visitors to the summit and the surprise panorama of seven counties.

The Landscape Institute Awards are presented annually to encourage and recognise outstanding examples of work by the landscape profession. The awards aim to:

- promote the art and science of landscape architecture
- advance the knowledge and understanding of the discipline
- celebrate professional expertise
- reward schemes that demonstrate a high level of commitment to sustainability.

Late News

Oakmere Parish Council

A meeting at the Community on the evening of April 3rd was attended by over 40 people, many of them concerned about a number of issues at present affecting Oakmere. Principal matters discussed were: the impact of housing on the area (particularly in the light of the massive developments likely on two sites in neighbouring Cuddington; planning, local employment, recreation and tourism in the area.

It was learned that Wainhomes has bought a strip of land from J&S (new owners of the former Harringtons site), possibly to provide the open space required as part of the new development on the Fourways site. Construction of the 35 or so homes on this site is apparently due to commence shortly.

A planning application has been submitted for development of the Marley and Crown Farm Quarries.

It was understood that the government is to give up to £10,000 to local authorities for each house built plus a further £300 per year for the first six years. Local authorities(CWAC in our case), it was reported, will return 20% of this sum to relevant local parish councils to fund the development of local amenities.

Jubilee News

Two Flagpoles for Delamere

At a recent meeting Delamere Parish Council agreed to purchase two flagpoles, one for the school and one for the community centre. It's hoped these will arrive in good time for the hoisting of the Union Jack on Jubilee Day.

Jubilee Service at Delamere Church

There is to be a special service celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee on Sunday, June 3rd at 10.30am. All are welcome.

Incidentally, visitors to the church on this or any other occasion should take a look at a plaque near the font. It records how the vestry was built to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. Before that the old vestry was a small room, now unused, behind the organ.

Forest Jubilee Picnic

The Forestry Commission invites anyone who would like to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee in the open air to a Jubilee Picnic Event on Sunday, June 3rd. Picnickers will gather (with picnics!) at the Events Arena.

At 2.00pm there will be a conducted walk to the top of Pale Heights.

Weather permitting, this should be an occasion to remember. Anyone who's never visited the hilltop before will find the view quite breathtaking.

Potential Mains Gas supply to Delamere /Oakmere

Hello, I'm Dr. Bob Clipperton from 75 Station Road and Robin, with the backing of the Parish Council, has kindly let me tell you in this newsletter that I've been exploring the possibility of getting a mains gas supply to Delamere / Oakmere for a couple of months.

I am told this has been tried before but no records exist of those tries, only word-of-mouth statements. Also, years ago, it seems, it was fairly easy to get a gas connection quote – all one had to do apparently was to 'phone British Gas/Transco and they would look into it quickly. But several years ago, Transco became National Grid - and other private companies, if they could convince the appropriate authorities that they could create proper and safe gas connections, were allowed to install pipelines. These companies are generically known as Utility Infrastructure Providers, or UIPs for short.

I am currently in discussions with two UIPs. They are both concerned about the geographical 'complexity' of, particularly, Delamere as a whole and one of them requires a fairly reliable estimate of how many properties would be committed to paying for mains gas installation.

Therein lies the main purpose of this communication. Below you will see tables of basically 3 columns. In the first, the UIP would like the main householder's name, and then the exact address and in column 3 a signature to confirm that you are interested in a mains gas connection. They also would like a telephone number but I will discuss with them why they need this. Let me stress at this point that by filling in this form you are NOT committing yourself to any expenditure – it is only an expression of interest.

So, I urge you to sign below so that this UIP will proceed. I have included 4 rows – please check with your neighbours to see if they are interested. Lee in Delamere Stores has kindly agreed to allow anyone to hand completed forms in there, - and I'll try to put a box in the Community centre.

Please don't expect results very quickly. These UIPs don't move very quickly but I will keep you updated as progress occurs. Finally, if any Oakmere residents wish to sign by all means do so – although you probably know that Wainhomes have to install mains gas when they start developing the old Fourways site.
