## UNWANTED EYESORE

### Water Board's Filtration Plant will blight Fishpool Road

United Utilities, much in evidence in the area in recent months, have reached an advanced stage in their plans to build a filtration plant just off the Fishpool Road. The exact location is in the hollow to the left about 200 yards past Fishpool Road Farm. Lying on the borders of Delamere and Utkinton, this is a particularly attractive area. Judging by the plans, the proposed plant threatens to be particularly unattractive.

Objections to the proposals focus on two main issues: the choice and size of the site and the size of the main building. Both were raised at a meeting of Delamere Parish Council on 24<sup>th</sup> April and neither was answered to the satisfaction of the objectors by the United Utilities representative who attended. The company has several sites in the locality any one of which could have been chosen for the plant without such a damaging effect on the environment. True, using one of these would have been rather less convenient from a logistics angle, but, since United Utilities are spending ten million pounds (no, it's not a typing error!) on the project, they can hardly use the need to economise as a defence. The other objection was to the height of the main building: not only will it look ugly and wholly unsuited to the rural setting it will desecrate, but the proposed height - well over 30 feet - is an additional bone of contention. The company claims that the height is needed for the storage of chemicals. Are so many chemicals needed for the filtration process? If they are, and doubts have been raised about this, and If the project has to go ahead, as now appears almost inevitable, then why cannot the building be sunk well below ground level?

United Utilities' whole approach to the matter has done little to win them friends in the area. Not only have they failed to deal with objections, but in the initial planning application to the local council their applicant stated that none of the land was part of an agricultural holding. In fact it is part of Sidebottom Farm on Stable Lane and is being purchased from the owner. Incidentally the land in question falls just inside the Delamere boundary, although the principal victims live over the boundary, in Utkinton. Country dwellers have had quite enough of outsiders who come with grandiose schemes and bulldoze (sometimes quite literally) their way over objections from those who will have to live with the mess after they've retreated to suburbia.

Utkinton Parish Council is holding a Parish Council meeting in Cote Brook Village Hall on Tuesday, 13<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30pm. This will be an open meeting to which members of the public are invited; at the start a United Utilities representative has been invited to attend to answer questions.

It is claimed that the filtration plant is necessary to avoid the dangers posed by cryptosporidium (a small parasite which, if swallowed, can cause gastroenteritis). This *can* occur in drinking water, but outbreaks of illness as a result are rare. Nevertheless, in view of the health implications it is unlikely that Vale Royal will turn down the planning application, though many people feel that they have acceded too readily - and with too little regard for the wellbeing of some of their council tax payers - to the exact nature and location of the application.

### From My Window

A very busy time for our feathered friends. Young are being nurtured and hopefully will survive predators such as the magpie, kestrel, etc.

Robin Ackerley reports that a ring ouzel had spent some time in their garden on 12th and 13th April. A rare sighting in this part of the country. It is of the family of warblers, flycatchers and thrushes. It is a summer visitor from Mediterranean countries arriving in late March and leaving in September, coming to the wild hills, moorlands and wooded valleys of Britain. Apart from the distinctive white crescent on the breast it looks rather like a mountain blackbird. It is no great singer and is rather a shy bird. The song is just a repetition of piping often delivered when perching on a rock or boulder. There is also a harsh alarm call. Like other members of the thrush family, in spring and summer it eats worms, insects and snails and in autumn, when preparing to migrate, takes berries and wild fruit. The nest is a grass cup either on or close to the ground and often near a stream. There are usually four eggs.

A cuckoo has been heard regularly on Eddisbury Hill Fort this spring.

Only one pair of swallows arrived back early in May, a couple of weeks later than usual. Hopefully this is not the beginning of a decline of this welcome visitor to our shores.

Yellowhammers, goldfinches, coal tits, overweight wood pigeons, ring doves and woody woodpecker are all happily visiting the garden. Not as welcome are the rabbits which are decimating the garden plants, but I would not wish them any harm.

On Saturday, while I was scooping out the duckweed from the pond, two round, cream-coloured small fish jumped out of the net. I quickly put them into the water. As we have not put any fish into the pond, where did they come from? The local aquarium said that a heron could possibly have dropped them in. I thought that herons took them out! Can anyone explain this conundrum?

Sparrows are returning to the bird table after not being seen for some months.



### **Oakmere Sand**

As you drive along the Northwich-Chester road past Crown Cottages at Oakmere it's hard to ignore the large entrance to the Fourways Quarry on the opposite side, but not so easy to see what's happened to a large area of Oakmere beyond. A glimpse through the hedges, however, will reveal that where once there were fields there is now water.

I recently arranged a meeting with the manager of the site (which is owned by Tarmac), Thomas. He was extremely helpful and gave up an hour of his time going through the history of Tarmac's activities in the area. The Fourways Quarry is one of four sites in Delamere and Oakmere. among them the Marley Quarry which was taken over by Tarmac in 1990, though work finished there some five years ago. The latest part of the site to be opened is at Hogshead where an initial fifteen acres have recently been leased from the Forestry Commission.

Twenty thousand years ago a glacier moved down the west coast from Scotland, travelling inland at the Dee Estuary and depositing an eighty-feet-thick sheet of sand in the region. It is the particular nature of this sand that is of relevance today. Technically today. known as "terminal moraine" the spherical-shaped deposits are of exceptional quality for use in the construction industry, hence the appeal of the area for Tarmac. Every day since 1970, when the Fourways site opened, a stream of wagons have come to collect sand for the building industry in Manchester, Liverpool and Stoke-

Shortly after quarrying began in the early 70s the present lake began to form, as had happened with Marley Tiles' excavations some years before; the water table was just fifteen feet below the surface. After the extraction of ten million tons all dredging ceased in 2004, leaving a lake of about fifty acres and seventy feet deep. Now only dry material is extracted, taken from above the water table.

The whole site is heavily mechanised. Sand is transported by conveyor, washed and desilted with water from the lake and the particles graded by size. At any time there are thirty thousand tons on site ready for sale.

Tarmac is, rightly, very conscious of its obligations to the environment and the locality. Their site at Ottersbank, now worked out, is in the process of being restored to agricultural land with trees. When work at the Fourways Quarry ends in about eight or nine

years' time the same will apply—though restoration is also an ongoing business. Acoustic bunds, banks to deaden sound as well as to improve the outlook, are already under construction. Even wagons leaving the site are required to pass through a wheelwash before rejoining the public highway.

The new Hogshead Wood site is host to a new wholly automated tree-removal system. All the timber is then baled and used to provide electricity for a new biomass power generator at Elesmere Port. The site is undergoing a phased development on the understanding that it will be replanted when quarrying has finished.

No plans have yet been made for the Fourways Quarry lake, which will of course remain, though as a potential leisure facility it has clearly much to offer.

The lake is a near neighbour of Oakmere Lake, a designated Ramsar site (a wetland of international ecological importance), which will feature in a later issue of this Newsletter.

The whole country has become much more aware of the importance of the environment in recent years and it's reassuring to know that in Tarmac we have on our doorstep a company which is so conscious of its duty to the area where it is working.

Footnote. Did you know that there is a public weighbridge at Fourways Quarry, where, for a fee of £4, you can weigh your trailer, or caravan, or even your horse if you can't get it to stand on the bathroom scales long enough.

### Good Citizen Award

On May 18<sup>th</sup> Pat Wheeler of Station Road was invited to a Cheshire Constabulary Awards Evening in Ellesmere Port where she was presented with a Good Citizens Award for her services to Home Watch. Congratulations Pat!

It is encouraging to see that voluntary work of this kind is recognised and duly awarded by the authorities.


